His coworkers flagged down **GEM electricians Randy Bryan** and **Cody Oblinger**, who were in a buggy.

Bryan got out, gave his seat to the Romanoff employee, and Oblinger drove him to the Romanoff trailer.

"While Cody gave him a ride, the other Romanoff guy let me know his coworker was having chest pains," Bryan says. "When I heard that, I called **Ryan Luck** [GEM electrician field supervisor] to get the number for **Deb Gacsal**, our on-site paramedic."

Oblinger and Bryan met Gacsal at the Romanoff trailer. She kept the patient stable until an ambulance arrived. He underwent emergency heart surgery at St. Luke's Hospital and is now recovering at home.

"It was a really good thing he made it to the hospital in time," Bryan says. "It took a team effort from a variety of people that day. We were happy to be a part of that."

FIND IT-FIX IT

RLI and GEM associates stay alert to eliminate hazards and find solutions

Find It-Fix It is a great tool to help us talk about safety and find solutions together.

RLI and GEM associates submitted these recent Find It-Fix Its:

Unsafe behavior: An associate was wearing a harness with the leg straps hanging down.

Solution: I stopped him and told him to put [the harness] on properly.

Unsafe condition: Traffic was backed up trying to enter the plant.

Solution: I informed safety and suggested a staggered start.

Unsafe behavior: An associate was entering the drive next to the break area, not looking as a forklift was driving by. **Solution:** I yelled to the associate to stop and placed cones near the break area.

Unsafe condition: A 30-foot I-beam was in a laydown area and hard to see in the morning.

Solution: I put orange cones on the steel.

Unsafe behavior: I noticed an apprentice carpenter using a sledge hammer to drive rebar with his hand positioned incorrectly. **Solution:** I stopped him and we discussed safer ways to get this accomplished without hurting his hands.

Unsafe condition: The bathroom soap dispenser was out of soap and employees were not following guidelines for hand washing.

Solution: I notified GEM supervision and an email was sent out to GEM and RLI safety personnel.

Unsafe behavior: A forklift driver was backing up with a heavy load without a spotter.

Solution: I spotted for the forklift driver.

Unsafe condition: An operator in an excavator digging next to the road was swinging to his blind side where pedestrians and vehicle traffic could be.

Solution: I stopped him and coached him to swing the other way.

Unsafe behavior: A customer's employee was walking down the center of a temporary road instead of the designated walkway.

Solution: I stopped him and asked him to use the walkway.

Unsafe behavior: I noticed an electrician standing on an A-frame ladder that was leaning up against a building.

Solution: I told him to get a different ladder since A-frame ladders shouldn't be used like that.

- Use Find It-Fix It every day. The number-one cause of many safety incidents is the failure to identify and eliminate hazards early before they have a chance to become incidents.
 - This is true for every kind of incident, from pinch-points to falls to weather-related injuries/illnesses.

Working safely has never been more important. Do it for your family, your friends, your coworkers and yourself.
